Field Projects in Palawan and Batangas

Ranger Station in Tubbataha, Palawan

In December 1999 the foundation of a new ranger station was finished. The entire structure will be done in March 2000. Funds granted by the Marine Parks Center of Japan of US\$11,500 have been utilized to supplement cost of the construction of the ranger station in Tubbataha as designed by the Philippine Navy and other partners in the management of the park. In addition, the funds have been used to raise awareness of visitors to the park and for monitoring of the area.

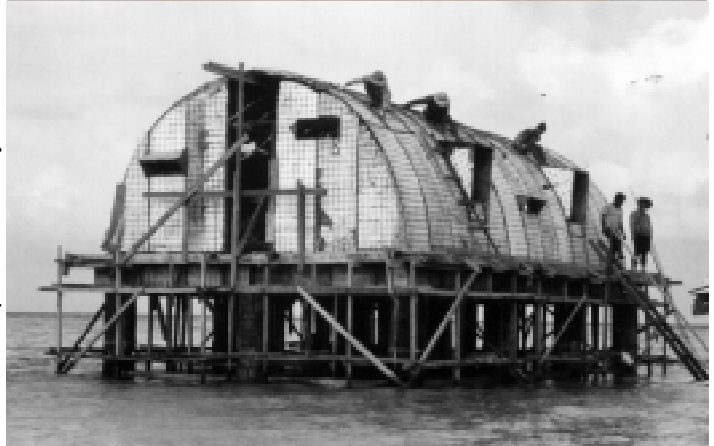
The old ranger station (photo below) was collapsing and the Philippine Navy needed a stable place to reside in to protect the only national marine park of the Philippines. Our appreciation for support goes to the Marine Parks Center of Japan, the Province of Palawan under Governor Socrates, SAGUDA Palawan and of course our board member Angelique Songco for coordinating the construction with the Navy.

It is to the credit of the Armed Forces of the Philippines through the Western Command in Palawan that Tubbataha is being guarded from illegal fishing activities. The new ranger station will make it easier to maintain a presence there and provide improved living conditions for Navy personnel and others visiting the station.

Tubbataha Reefs National Marine Park Educational Campaign

This project supported by the CORAL Reef Alliance has been successfully completed. Through the efforts of Angelique Songco and her staff, this project has helped increase awareness of Palawan-based fishermen and tourism operators about the need to conserve Tubbataha Reefs National Marine Park. A video based on the existing footage of Tubbataha reef ecology and management, dubbed in Tagalog, was shown in ten fishing communities. A flip chart about Tubbataha reefs in English and Tagalog was used to educate fishing villages, communities and divers on board the various live-aboard dive boats. A follow-up activity to this project will be continued briefings for divers visiting Tubbataha.

Reef Management in Tingloy, Batangas

Funds from the Coral Reef Alliance, Kabang Kalikasan ng Pilipinas (KKP) and donor Richard Hirsch amounting to P423,000 are supporting this project. Activities started in late 1998 with an initial dissemination of information on the need for marine conservation in the area. Ongoing activities this year (2000) include: 1) installation of several anchor buoys using appropriate, practical and cheap designs and involving local residents in their installation; 2) supporting community management of marine sanctuaries; and 3) the development of an integrated plan for the Mabini-Tingloy tourism and traditional use area.

In December 1999, Daniel Ocampo, the project field worker, organized an exhibit "Ang Kalayaan ng Ating Yaman-Dagat" in Barangay Santo Tomas together with KKP and Haribon Foundation. It was well attended and the exhibit is still on display in the house of the Barangay captain (see photos).

In February 2000, Daniel Ocampo organized a study tour for about 10 members of the Santo Tomas community to visit San Salvador Island, Zambales and Bolinao, Pangasinan. It is hoped that this trip will catalyze interest on the part of the barangay group to initiate a marine sanctuary in their area to protect important reef resources.

This project site is also an expansion area of the Coastal Resource Management Project (CRMP) supported by the United States Agency for International Development. Mayor Atienza of Tingloy, late last year, signed a memorandum of agreement with CRMP, Sulu Fund and KKP to work together on coastal management activities. The mayor's enthusiasm for protecting coral reefs in this area is encouraging so that it is expected that year 2000 will be productive for improving coastal management in Tingloy Municipality.

Other Field Projects

Bohol Marine Triangle

The Sulu Fund together with the Coastal Resource Management Project were asked by the Foundation for Philippine Environment to assist in the design of a large marine conservation program for the Bohol Marine Triangle which includes Panglao, Balicasag and Pamilacan Islands off southern Bohol Island. Thomas Bayer and Alan White have been working on this project design together with the Silliman University Marine Laboratory and the Bohol Integrated Development Foundation (BIDEF). The project proposal will be submitted for final review by the United Nations Development Programme and the Global Environment Facility in March 2000. If all goes well with the review and it is approved, it is possible that funding could be made available of US\$750,000 by the end of this year. The ultimate project will be implemented by the Foundation for Philippine Environment with assistance from its partners in the design process along with the local governments and communities of the area.

Saving Philippine Reefs Tubbataha Expedition on May 21-30, 2000

We are preparing for this upcoming research expedition (May 21-30, 2000 in Tubbataha). We will conduct the expedition in cooperation with CRMP to update baseline data on Tubbataha Reefs collected in 1984, 1989, 1992 and 1996. Paying volunteers are mostly the past Earthwatch divers. Angelique Songco will be one of the divemasters on board. Jonathan Apurado of the University of San Carlos will be the technical divemaster. Any interested party please contact Sulu Fund. Two slots are still available.

Beneath Philippine Seas 1997, Robert Yin, 135 pages, hardbound Pesos 1800; \$US50 and softbound Pesos 1300; \$US40 [A wonderful assortment of large underwater photos on each page by one of the most dedicated Filipino photographers residing in San Diego, CA]

Philippine Coral Reefs in Watercolor 1997, Rafael Cusi (artist), Bortles, L., White, A.T., and Cassey, C. (text), 128 pages, hardbound. Pesos 1800; \$US50. [A stunning collection of watercolor paintings depicting Philippine coral reefs at their best in an extremely pleasing style. This unique book is enhanced by text which describes both the plight of coral reefs and the activities underway in the Philippines to conserve and manage this valuable resource.]

Field Guide to the Common Mangroves, Seagrasses and Algae of the Philippines 1997, Hilconida Calumpong and Ernani Menez, 197 pages, soft-cover. Pesos 500; \$US17. [This is the first comprehensive and authoritative book on the common marine plants of Philippine shores and reefs. It facilitates identification to the species level with good, clear photographs.]

A Field Guide to Whales and Dolphins in the Philippines 1997, Jose Ma. Lorenzo P. Tan, 50 pages, soft-cover. Pesos 395; \$US13. [The first guide book on whale watching in the Philippines. It reveals the diversity of cetaceans in the Philippines and has many good photographs with an attractive layout.]

Tales from Tubbataha: Natural History, Resource Use, and Conservation of the Tubbataha Reefs Palawan, Philippines 2000, Yasmin Arquiza and Alan White, 136 pages, soft-cover. Pesos 595 US\$15 (book launching is on February 29, 2000) [This is the only book which summarizes the status of Tubbataha Reef National Marine Park in a comprehensive and readable manner. It tracks the changes in the coral reef environment from the many impacts of people and in relation to political forces.]

Philippine Coral Reefs, A Natural History Guide 1987, Alan White, 223 pages, soft-cover, Pesos 600; \$US20. [This is the most comprehensive guidebook to Philippine reefs in print with 240 photos and lists of the most common marine organisms with accurate descriptions.]
